Hometime Dark was commissioned by Berwick Townscape Heritage Initiative in association with Inspire Northumberland. The images and poetry presented in the twin volumes capture the hidden human stories and voices within two important Berwick buildings – and the bustling commercial, family and social life they once contained.

As part of the project artist Mike Golding and writer Jacob Polley were invited to explore the buildings and family firm of William Cowe and Sons; makers of the famous Berwick Cockle sweet. *Hometime Dark* is the results of their conversations, imaginings and discoveries.

"Using photography to gather up physical evidence, my subject has become time itself and the idea of narrative, the images transforming the objects, traces and images into metaphors for memory and its fragmentary, involuntary drawing of the past. In this way the photographs create an archive of the psychological repercussions of the space, traces and still lives with which the viewer can imaginatively engage to create their own stories".
